Speaker + Artist Bios

Shelly Rambo (she/her/hers) is Associate Professor of Theology at Boston University School of Theology. Her research and teaching interests focus on religious responses to trauma and moral injury. She is author of Spirit and Trauma: A Theology of Remaining (Westminster John Knox, 2010), Resurrecting Wounds: Living in the Afterlife of Trauma (Baylor University Press, 2017), and co-edited volume with Wendy Cadge, Chaplaincy and Spiritual Care in the Twenty-First Century: An Introduction (UNC Press, 2022). She is currently directing a Lilly Endowment grant ("Trauma-Responsive Congregations") focused on supporting urban congregational leaders in their efforts to respond to collective trauma.

Indhira Udofia LCSW, MDiv, MSW, STM (she/they) provides community and clinical care through a wide range of praxis including therapeutic and spiritual services, clinical and academic research, writing and collaborative projects. Her extensive work experiences in clinical and community settings (since 2009) and faith communities (since 2014) shaped her deep passion for helping communities and individuals recover from trauma, especially in spaces of spiritual abuse and grief. Indhira believes that her work is a collaborative effort to empower others in their own lives and healing journey. Indhira utilizes strengths-based methodologies that holistically embrace individuals. In the context of community, she utilizes client-based appropriate practices and rituals, restorative practices, and trauma-informed consultation to address power dynamics, conflict resolution, self-care, and other issues that may arise within a healing framework for the flourishing of the collective. Rev. Kathryn House, Ph.D. (she/her/hers) is Assistant Professor of Leadership Studies and Practical Theology and Chair of the Rev. Dr. Lee Barker Professorship of Leadership Studies at Meadville Lombard Theological School. House's research interests include prophetic religious leadership, evangelical purity culture, liberation theologies, religious trauma, theologies of vocation, practical theology, and Baptist theology. Her current project, an expansion of her dissertation The Afterlife of White Evangelical Purity Culture: Wounds, Legacies, and Impacts, investigates the theological legacies of white evangelical purity culture (WEPC) and proposes a Baptist theology of baptism as a practice of solidarity in response. Her project foregrounds the passionate evangelical millennialism of antebellum female moral reformers' efforts to curb prostitution between 1834 and 1838; the faith-based activism of women who fought to end, as well as to foment, racial terror lynchings in the United States; and contemporary criticisms and constructive ethics of the most recent purity movement known as evangelical purity culture. It also considers recent resonant debates over dissonant deployments of bodily and religious freedom during the COVID-19 pandemic.



I hold an MSc. from Champlain College in Applied Conflict Studies with a concentration in Organizational Development, a BFA in Fibers & Textiles from Maryland Institute College of Art, and a certificate in Spiritual Direction from Still Harbor. I work with others to build empowered communication and to create resilient, inclusive, and vibrant lives, communities, and workplaces centering agency, connection, liberation, presence, and wholeness. I am passionate about social justice and promoting peace, healing, and transformation at the individual, community, organizational, and societal levels.

Queer Spiritual Direction + Ritual and Ceremony

Spiritual Direction: I offer interfaith spiritual direction for LGBTQIA+ individuals and community groups. Spiritual Direction may support your exploration of various spiritual practices, deepen your relationship with what you find sacred, heal from religious trauma, or navigate life changes. Rooted deep in an understanding that you are the expert of your own experience, my role is to hold sacred space and support your exploration of your spirituality, faith journey, and meaning-making practices. I companion primarily with trans and queer people as you explore, question, discern, and celebrate.

Ritual and Ceremony: To honor you and stages of your journey. I offer both religious and non-religious ceremonies to celebrate various transitions and important moments, including: sacred re-namings, rituals for Queer High Holy Days, weddings, poly unions, and more!

Healing From Religious Harm Facilitation

Healing Religious Harm: Whether you are an individual or group who has experienced harm, or part of an institution that has caused spiritual harm, it can be difficult to know where to begin the healing journey. I offer one-on-one consultations and group facilitation for individuals and religious communities seeking to heal religious and spiritual harm. I often partner with other facilitators from various backgrounds and experiences depending on your community needs.

I am a queer minister and certified spiritual director, and I am ordained by the Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches (UFMCC); a denomination founded by and for the queer community.
